

collection of thirty one syllable Japanese poetry or waka along with a translation of a representative selection of his Chinese verse or kanshi Although D gen is generally considered to be more of a philosopher than a poet his verse has great value for several reasons First the poems most of which were composed on the mountain peak of Eiheiji Temple the Temple of Eternal Peace as pictured on the front cover are beautiful displaying D gen s remarkable facility with language Second the Japanese and Chinese collections illuminate key aspects of his life and thought not revealed in his prose writings including his trips to China and Kamakura his feelings about Kyoto while living in Eiheiji in the northern provinces and his feelings about death
