

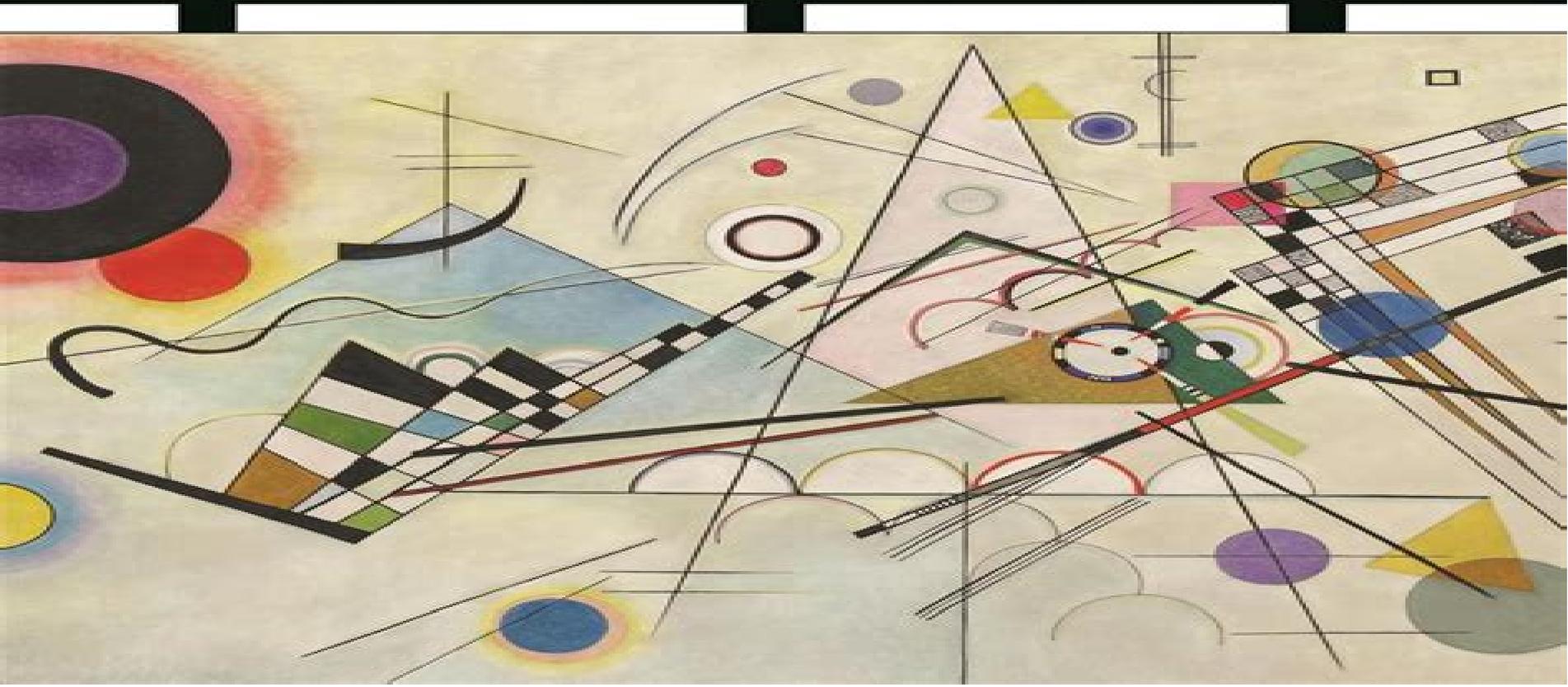

Black Social Capital Marion Orr,1999 Deindustrialization white flight and inner city poverty have spelled trouble for Baltimore schools Marion Orr now examines why school reform has been difficult to achieve there revealing the struggles of civic leaders and the limitations placed on Baltimore s African American community as each has tried to rescue a failing school system Examining the interplay between government and society Orr presents the first systematic analysis of social capital both within the African American community black social capital and outside it where social capital crosses racial lines Orr shows that while black social capital may have created solidarity against white domination in Baltimore it hampered African American leaders capacity to enlist the cooperation from white corporate elites and suburban residents needed for school reform Orr examines social capital at the neighborhood level in elite level interactions and in intergovernmental relations to argue that black social capital doesn t necessarily translate into the kind of intergroup coalition needed to bring about school reform He also includes an extensive historical survey of the black community showing how distrust engendered by past black experiences has hampered the formation of significant intergroup social capital The book features case studies of school reform activity including the first analysis of the politics surrounding Baltimore s decision to hire a private for profit firm to operate nine of its public schools These cases illuminate the paradoxical aspects of black social capital in citywide school reform while offering critical perspectives on current debates about privatization site based management and other reform alternatives Orr s book challenges those who argue that social capital alone can solve fundamentally political problems by purely social means and questions the efficacy of either privatization or black community power to reform urban schools Black Social Capital offers a cogent conceptual synthesis of social capital theory and urban regime theory that demonstrates the importance of government politics and leadership in converting social capital into a resource that can be mobilized for effective social change *Governing the White House* Charles Eliot Walcott,Karen Marie Hult,1995 Charles Walcott and Karen Hult maintain that the organization of the White House influences presidential performance much more than commonly thought and that organization theory is an essential tool for understanding that influence Their book offers the first systematic application of organizational governance theory to the structures and operations of the White House Office Using organizational theory to analyze what at times has been a rather ad hoc and disorganized office might seem quixotic After all the White House Office exists within a turbulent political environment that encourages expedient decision making And every four to eight years it must be reinvented by presidents who have their own theories and preferences about how to organize a staff to serve their policy needs But Walcott and Hult argue that White House staffs are not simply puppets of presidential preference and style Yes staff structures evolve primarily from presidents strategic responses to external demands But those structures in turn significantly influence how the executive branch perceives and responds to further

demands The first part of their book lays out the theoretical argument The second examines White House outreach congressional liaison press relations personnel selection executive branch oversight and interest group and intergovernmental liaison The third focuses on White House handling of policy development and implementation The fourth analyzes staff structures that facilitate the operation of the presidency itself presidential writing and scheduling staff management and cabinet coordination The book concludes by identifying general patterns in the emergency nature and stability of governance structures in the White House Original and instructive *Governing the White House* provides a much needed primer on the inner workings of the White House staff and will be an essential volume for anyone studying the presidency

Controlling Public Education Kathryn A. McDermott, 1999 Most Americans believe that local school districts are the only means by which citizens may exercise control over public education Kathryn McDermott argues to the contrary that existing local institutions are no longer sufficient for achieving either equity or democratic governance Not only is local control inequitable it also fails to live up to its reputation for guaranteeing public participation and citizen influence Drawing upon democratic theory and the results of field research in New Haven Connecticut and three suburbs McDermott contends that our educational system can be made more democratic by centralizing control over funding while decentralizing most authority over schools to the level of schools themselves while enacting public school choice controlled for racial balance To many people in Connecticut and elsewhere the tension between equal opportunity for all students and local control of public education seems impossible to resolve In 1996 the Connecticut Supreme Court ruled in *Sheff v O'Neill* that local control produces unconstitutional segregation of public schools Nearly all of the state's 169 towns operate their own public schools and like the towns they serve the schools are generally homogeneous with respect to race and socioeconomic class In the *Sheff* ruling the court declared that making school districts coterminous with town lines is the single most important factor contributing to the present concentration of racial and ethnic minorities in the Hartford public school system At the same time the court also acknowledged that the town based school system presently furthers the legitimate nonracial interests of permitting considerable local control and accountability in educational matters In Connecticut and elsewhere it has often seemed necessary to choose between local control and equity in public education and local control has almost always won McDermott argues that rather than seeing local control and equity as conflicting goals policymakers should regard them as equally important components of democracy in public education In her view a truly democratic system of education should both encourage citizen participation in school governance and contribute to the formation and maintenance of a social order in which equality of opportunity prevails over hierarchies of privilege Centralizing distribution of resources and using controlled choice to end racial isolation would provide greater equality of opportunity while decentralizing management of schools would expand citizen participation McDermott's conclusions break new ground in our understanding of local school governance itself and call into question the conventional wisdom about local participation These findings should interest

those who study school governance and reform especially in an urban setting as well as policy makers administrators teachers students and citizens eager to improve their schools

Empowering the White House Karen Marie Hult,Charles Eliot Walcott,2004 On the surface the new president seems to inherit an empty house Hugh Hecllo a recognized expert on American democratic institutions has noted In fact he enters an office already shaped and crowded by other people s desires Empowering the White House examines how Richard Nixon entered that crowded Oval Office in 1969 yet managed to change it in a way that augmented the power of the presidency and continues to influence into the twenty first century how his successors have governed Nixon s White House is perhaps best remembered for the growth in the size of the staff which operated under the supposed iron fist of H R Haldeman But more important than size and management style to the character of the Nixon White House were the assigned tasks complexity and dynamics of the burgeoning staff Faced with hostile majorities in Congress and executive branch careerists assumed to be committed to a Democratic agenda Nixon sought to control his political fate by engaging more actively than earlier presidents in public relations and the mobilization of support At the command and under the control of the Oval Office the staff carried out assignments designed to fulfill Nixon s aims This theoretically informed and well researched study explains how Nixon changed and expanded the institutionalized presidency and how that affected the Ford and Carter administrations Nixon ushered in a new stage in the modern presidency by organizing and using his increasingly complex staff in new ways that have persisted beyond the 1970s to this day To a greater degree than any predecessor Nixon systematized outreach legal advice and policy formulation His White House staffing then has come to be regarded as a standard model that influences incoming presidents regardless of party affiliation Leavening this organizational study are revealing accounts of how the Nixon Ford and Carter staffs operated behind the scenes in the West Wing Anyone needing to know how the White House worked during those presidencies or how it has worked since will find this book invaluable
