

How to Write an Autobiography

Tips to write an autobiography:

Like the examples of autobiographies discussed above, any autobiography needs to deal with a few aspects:

Introduction: One needs to give an introduction about themselves in the autobiography. This introduction needs to contain basic aspects like name, where you live, when and where were you born, what conditions were you born in, etc.

Autobiography Reader For Writers:

The Fiction of Autobiography Micaela Maftai, 2013-07-04 Writing autobiography is a complicated often fraught activity for both writer and reader We can find many recent examples of the way such writing calls into question the author's truthfulness or their authority to present as definitive their version of a particular event or portion of their lives Drawing upon a wide range of late twentieth and early twenty first century autobiographical writing *The Fiction of Autobiography* examines key aspects of autobiography from the interrelated perspectives of author reader critic and scholar to reconsider how we view this form of writing and its relationship to the way we understand and construct identity Maftai considers recent cases and texts such as Didion's *The Year of Magical Thinking* and Frey's *A Million Little Pieces* alongside older texts such as Proust's *In Search of Lost Time* Nabokov's *Invitation of a Memory* and Stein's *The Autobiography of Alice B Toklas* In part this is to emphasise that key issues reappear and arise over decades and centuries and that texts distanced by time can speak to each other thoughtfully and poignantly

The Memoir and the Memoirist Thomas Larson, 2007 The memoir is the most popular and expressive literary form of our time Writers embrace the memoir and readers devour it propelling many memoirs by relative unknowns to the top of the best seller list Writing programs challenge authors to disclose themselves in personal narrative Memoir and personal narrative urge writers to face the intimacies of the self and ask what is true In *The Memoir and the Memoirist* critic and memoirist Thomas Larson explores the craft and purpose of writing this new form Larson guides the reader from the autobiography and the personal essay to the memoir a genre focused on a particularly emotional relationship in the author's past an intimate story concerned more with who is remembering and why than with what is remembered *The Memoir and the Memoirist* touches on the nuances of memory of finding and telling the truth and of disclosing one's deepest self It explores the craft and purpose of personal narrative by looking in detail at more than a dozen examples by writers such as Mary Karr Frank McCourt Dave Eggers Elizabeth Wurtzel Mark Doty Nuala O Faolain Rick Bragg and Joseph Lelyveld to show what they reveal about themselves Larson also opens up his own writing and that of his students to demonstrate the hidden mechanics of the writing process For both the interested reader of memoir and the writer wrestling with the craft *The Memoir and the Memoirist* provides guidance and insight into the many facets of this provocative and popular art form

Consuming Autobiographies Claire Boyle, 2007 Since 1975 French literary writing has been marked by an autobiographical turn which has seen authors increasingly often tap into the vein of what the French term *criture de soi* This coincides paradoxically with the death of autobiography as these authors self consciously distance themselves and their writings from conventional autobiography founding a *nouvelle autobiographie* where the very possibility of autobiographical expression is questioned In the first book length study in English to address this phenomenon Claire Boyle sheds a new light on this hostility toward autobiography through a series of ground breaking studies of estrangement in
