1.



LEVEL 1

Requiring Support

- Lowest Level and "Highest Functioning"
- Difficulty initiating social interactions
- Decreasing interest in social interactions
- Struggling with switching between activities
- Organizing and planning problems

2.



LEVEL 2

Requiring Substantial Support

- Noticeable social impairments even with support
- Problems with verbal and nonverbal social communication
- Struggling coping with change
- Changing focus or activities can cause distress
- Frequently appearing restrictive or repetitive behaviors

3.



LEVEL 3

Requiring Very Substantial Support

- Severe problems with verbal and nonverbal social communication
- Frequently appearing restrictive or repetitive behaviors that interfere with daily functioning in all aspects of life
- Changing focus or activities cause severe distress
- Extreme difficulty coping with change
- Rarely speaking logically and with few words
